How is Shrove Tuesday celebrated around the world?

Brazil

Rio's world-famous carnival takes place over the week leading up to Ash Wednesday, dating back from 1723. The celebration mixed with African traditions gradually evolved into a party with street music, sounds of samba, Brazilian dancing and lots of eating.

USA

Only one party can beat Brazil for sheer spectacle and wildness – Mardi Gras in New Orleans. Revelers come in purple, gold and green costume and dress themselves with long beads. From there, it's a nonstop procession of parties, parades, music and food.

Spain

Carnaval starts on Thursday – the week before Ash Wednesday and it is known as the "Day of the Omelette" or Dia de la tortilla. The celebrations vary across the country, but it's generally a day of clearing out the pantry of meat and bread and eating a meal as a community. The typical meal is an omelette, of course.

France

Pancake day is France is called "la Chandeleur" and is celebrated on the 2nd of February. On Shrove Tuesday it is known as Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday, where people eat fatty foods before they begin fasting on Ash Wednesday. The French are famous for their delicious crepes, which are served both sweet or savoury

Denmark

The Danish swap pancakes for buns, and celebrate "Fastelavn" on the last Sunday before lent. They have Danish style buns filled with whipped cream and jam – yum!

Canada

Objects with symbolic value are baked into the pancakes in Canada – coins, wedding rings and buttons. The coin finders are believed to become rich, the finder of the ring will be the first married and the button finders will go on to be a tailor or seamstress.

History Of Valentine's Day



Valentine's day around the world is celebrated in the name of Saint Valentine, but who's this mysterious saint and why's the festival celebrated with such gusto! Although the truth behind the festival is murky, there are a few stories you would like to know. It's said that Valentine was a priest who served during the 3rd century in Rome, And when emperor Claudius II announced that single men made better soldiers than those with families and wives, he outlawed marriage for young soldiers.

Valentine went against this injustice being done to young men and started performing secret marriages for young lovers. When the emperor found out about Valentine's actions, he ordered that the saint be put to death. The other tale suggests that the saint may have been killed while helping the Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were tortured. Gradually, Saint Valentine became so popular that couples all across the world started celebrating Valentine's Day as the day of love.
